

Brown-Franklin Historic Norfolk Map

Finding Aid

April 19, 2017

Norfolk, Virginia's long history is layered with Algonquin speaking people, Europeans, Africans and their descendants, and others who shaped this mid-Atlantic port. Established officially as a town by the British Crown in 1682, the area was actually settled generations before--shortly after Jamestown and grew into a hub of international renown. By 1736 the (upgraded) "Borough" thrived until its destruction in the American Revolution.

Then, up from the ashes of what was called "chimney town" rose the substantial homes of Moses Myers, the Tazewells and Willoughbys; wharves; the customs house; shops and taverns; a repaired St. Paul's Church and numerous other places of worship; academies; theaters; coffee houses; hospitals; and orphanages. A poorhouse was built to fill the gap left by the departure of the Anglican Church in the revolutionary war as a reformulated Common Council began the work of governing--setting up fire brigades, night watches, schools, public wells and ferry contracts and buying land for municipal burial grounds.

The landscape has changed dramatically over time--with waterways filled in, roads rerouted, buildings and old neighborhoods torn down to make way for the new. Today we see but a tiny remnant of centuries past in our downtown and the outlying area; much of it is reflected only in signs, street names, tree-lined cemeteries and a

few old buildings. Thankfully we have an idea of what was here before--due to the diligence of Grover Franklin and Lionel Brown of Norfolk Bureau of Surveys.

In 1982, to celebrate the city's 300-year anniversary, Lionel Brown and Grover Franklin used an 1899 map as a foundation. On this they added notes of interest--gallows, forgotten graveyards, long-gone structures and property owned by legendary people--gleaned from surveys and historic sources. They depicted the waterfront west to Fort Norfolk, east to site of the current Tides Stadium and north up to Borough's boundary from 1761 to 1911--near Hebrew Cemetery.

In July, 2016, the city attorney granted permission to local historian Cheryl Copper to launch a new iteration of the Franklin-Brown map for broader distribution. A one-inch grid was added to the Brown-Franklin map and the information in each square was organized to guide the reader in locating the wealth of features Mr. Brown and Mr. Franklin discovered and shared.

The Norfolk Society for Cemetery Conservation, funded the production of the new map and its first 500 copies. NSCC posts a simple finding aid on its web site. A more detailed version of the guide--with photos and descriptions--will be available soon with sponsorship opportunities.
